Speaker

The speaker is Dr Rodney Grapes who will talk on 'The 1848 earthquakes and the destruction of Wellington'

Wellington was only a fledgling settlement of some 3000 people when it was struck by a cluster of devastating earthquakes in 1848. The fearful violence of the shocks, the destruction of property, and the frequency and continuance of the danger caused universal alarm, and it was feared the settlement and its future was ruined. But Wellington did recover, quite quickly. In Karori, Judge Henry Chapman recorded details of the earthquakes and their effects on a daily basis. Although not known or understood at the time, the fault that ruptured to produce the first great shock of the 1848 earthquakes was the Awatere Fault in Marlborough; historical evidence suggests that other great shocks in the 1848 sequence may have been accompanied by movement on the Ohariu and Wellington Faults in the North Island, suggesting that the earthquake clustering was controlled by fault interactions across Cook Strait.

Wellington born, Dr Rodney Grapes has had a distinguished academic career both in New Zealand and overseas. A PhD from Victoria in 1972 was followed by a post-doctoral fellowship to Japan. As a result of that research he was awarded a DSc. from the Japanese Imperial Universities in 1976. He returned to Victoria in 1977 where in held an academic position in Geology. In 1982 & 1986 he was a Humbolt Fellow at Ruhr University, Germany. He was Visiting Professor to Kokkaido University in 1987 and Ehime University in Shikoku in 1990. From 2001 until late 2005 he was Professor of Mineralogy at the University of Freiburg in Germany. He was then appointed Professor of Geology at Sun Yat-sen University in Canton China, and from 2007 to 2010 was Professor at Korea University, Seoul.
