Talk

Our speaker is Dr Christopher Pugsley, ONZM, FRHistS, who will speak on "The NZ experience at Gallipoli and what it means today and its future importance".

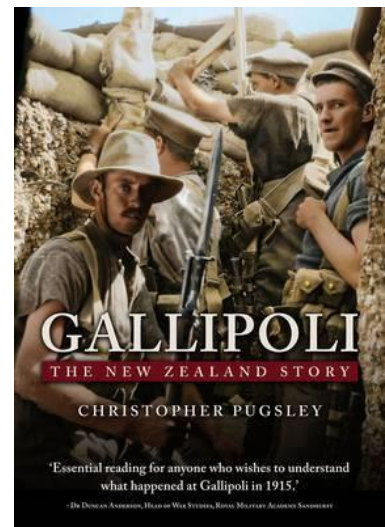
Dr Christopher Pugsley is one of New Zealand's leading military historians who has written on all aspects of New Zealand military history. A former New Zealand Infantry officer, he is an authority on New Zealanders at war.

His works include *Gallipoli: The New Zealand Story*, now in its fifth edition; *On the Fringe of Hell: New Zealanders and Military Discipline in the First World War*; and *The Anzac Experience: New Zealand, Australia and Empire in the First World War*. His recent work *A Bloody Road Home: World War Two and New Zealand's Heroic Second Division* was a finalist in the 2015 Templer Medal for British and Commonwealth Military History and the Ernest Scott Prize for Australian and New Zealand history.

He has just co-edited with Charles Ferrall, *Remembering Gallipoli: Interviews with New Zealand Gallipoli Veterans* (Victoria University Press).

September Speaker

Oliver Sutherland presented a talk on '**Ivan Sutherland (1897-1952): academic and social activist**'. The talk outlined in fascinating detail the range of activities Ivan took on or was involved in, from attacking the rise of the eugenics movement, campaigning for public radio and helping to launch the Wellington Film Society. Together with friend and colleague Professor Philip Robertson, he was a patron of the controversial Wellington-based English artist Christopher Perkins.

His commitment to social psychology drew him into the world of Ngati Porou where Sir Apirana Ngata became a second mentor and lifelong friend. In his 1935 publications *The Maori Situation* Sutherland denounced pakeha 'racialism' and affirmed his commitment to a bicultural New Zealand and to Ngata's vision for the economic, cultural and social development of Maori.
