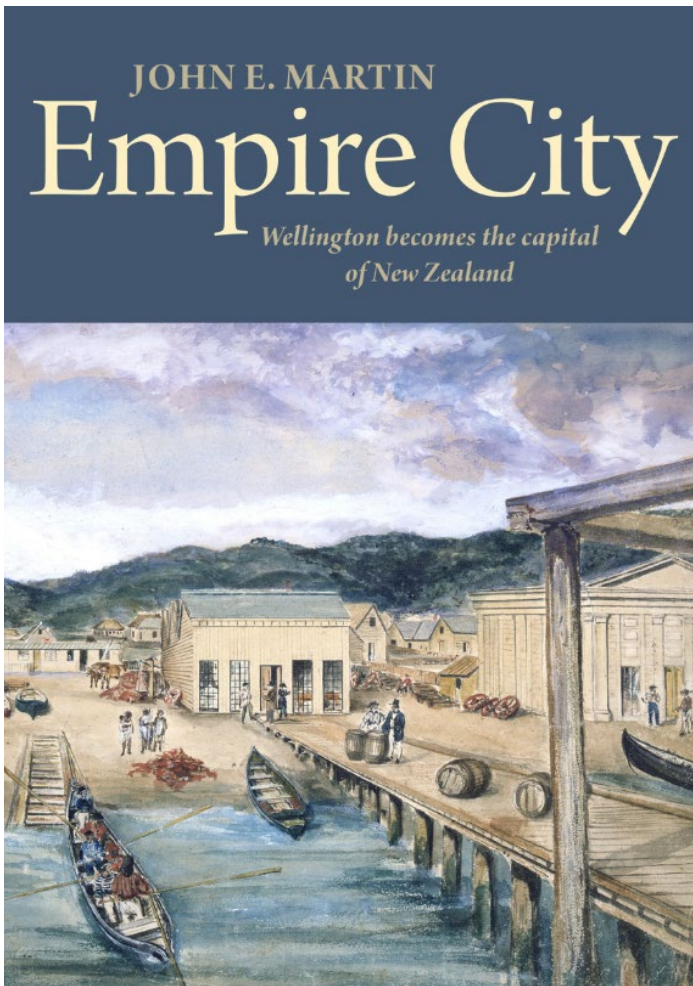

***Empire City: Wellington Becomes the Capital of New Zealand***



Join us for a talk by Dr John Martin about his new book *Empire City*, just launched in November. The book takes Wellington from the first encounter between Māori and the New Zealand Company in Te Whanganui-a-Tara in 1839 to it becoming the Empire City by the 1870s.

Dr. John E. Martin has researched and written about New Zealand history for forty years. Before becoming parliamentary historian he worked in the Historical Branch of the Department of Internal Affairs and taught in universities. His publications include rural and labour history, the history of science and engineering, and social and political history.

## ***Johnstons Hill Domain turns 80***

There is a certain amount of serendipity in historical research, as there is in life, as the following shows. Just this weekend I spent a pleasant afternoon at Raumati with John Penlington, both to catch up on the state of the world but also to discuss archives relating to his grandfather, architect Edmund Anscombe. Architecture must run in the family; John is a retired architect, and his father was also an architect; George Felgate Penlington, who was Assistant Government Architect, under Robert Adams Patterson. The family were also Karori residents, George designing the family home at 16 Hauraki Street which was built in 1934.



As well as sharing the architectural plans for the Centennial Exhibition, for which Anscombe was the architect (and was the reason I was visiting with my City Archives hat on), John also shared photographs of the building models he made in his youth, as well as other family photographs.

One was of his father George, standing next to a sign for Penlington's Track, leading up to Fletcher's Lookout. The photo was taken by Hubert Fletcher, and is reproduced to the left.

This is where the serendipity comes in to play – earlier in the week when discussing content for this newsletter,

Chris had suggested we feature Johnson's Hill Domain, which celebrates its 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year. Filing that thought away in my mind to write something up, not realising that in a couple of days I'd be viewing a photograph of one of the two key people who saw the land preserved as recreation area, photographed by the other!

Johnston's Hill Domain was officially declared a public recreation area in March 1942. The bush remnants on Johnston Hill and nearby Otari-Wilton's Bush are part of a significant native ecosystem - the native forest that extends from here all the way to Khandallah and Johnsonville Parks.
