Future Plans:

Wellington subdivision advertising bills from the early 20th century

The years leading up to the First World War saw a large increase in Wellington's population with a booming economy and high migration from the UK. Coupled with local body amalgamation and improved transport infrastructure, property developers and business 'syndicates' seized the opportunity to acquire and subdivide large blocks of land for new housing on the outskirts of the city with varying degrees of success.

Gábor's talk will draw upon newly digitised advertising bills and subdivision plans selected from the heritage collections of the Onslow Historical Society and Wellington City Libraries.

June speaker: New Zealand women in architecture and the story of Lucy Greenish

After the AGM Elizabeth Cox gave a presentation about Lucy Greenish, New Zealand's first registered female architect.

Lucy and her family moved with their parents to New Zealand as young adults in around 1908. Her father died soon after, but her mother Margaret and her three children continued to live together in Karori for many years.

Soon after her husband's death Margaret advertised that she could tutor in woodcarving and art, and then set up her own kindergarten and school on Karori Road, teaching the groundbreaking **Froebel kindergarten method**, which emphasized the importance of play for children, and the connection between play and creativity. Lucy and her siblings helped with the Christmas parties for the school and painting the sets for their plays.



Elizabeth took us through Lucy's career both training and practising as an architect, and the challenges she faced in her personal life; her time as a governess at the Walter Peak Station in Queensland, the traumatic move to Australia to have her illegitimate baby, and her later life with a sole practice in Lower Hutt in 1927.

Annual subscriptions for 2024-2025

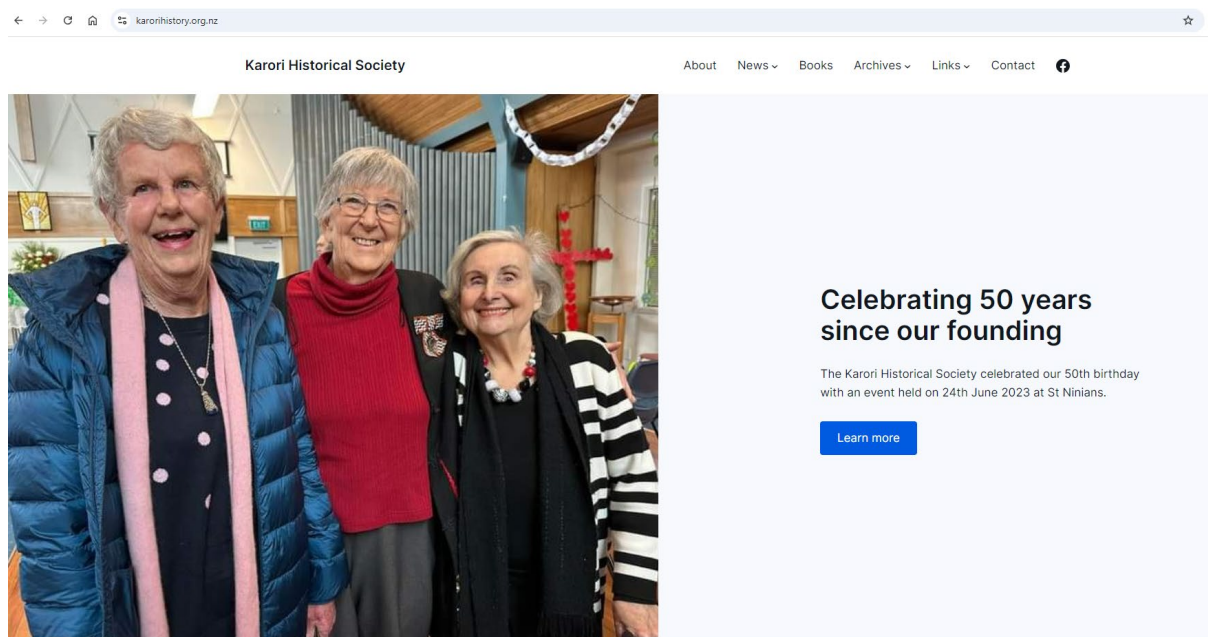
